


Welcome

Dear Friends,

It is a pleasure to write to you and offer deep gratitude for all that you do to lead God's people in worship, week-by-week. Leading worship is a great joy, but it's also demanding. We know the preparation an act of worship requires: the prayer, the study, the cost and joy of wrestling with God's Word and word, and what they mean for lives, churches, communities and God's world, with all of their fears and hopes, hatred and love. Increasingly,

too, the pressures of the preaching plan mean we're taking on more acts of worship. That can be a privilege, but it can also be exhausting, and can lead to weariness.

The service for the admission of local preachers opens with these words, which I find powerful and comforting: "The Lord gave the word, and great was the company of the preachers". Each one of us, Local Preacher or Worship Leader, is part of a great Connexional community, praying for and supporting one another and, of course, part of the communion of saints. Kathy Galloway's hymn, invites us to:

Sing for God's saints who have travelled faith's journey before us, Who in our weariness give us their hope to restore us; In them we see The new creation to be, Spirit of love made flesh for us.

And so, I invite you to take a moment to remember a Local Preacher or Worship Leader who has played an important part in your faith journey. For me growing up in the late 1980s in Kent, that person was a Local Preacher, a farmer. I can't remember what he said, but I do remember for the first time an overwhelming sense of the presence of God - in retrospect, there was something about his sincerity and honesty, his deeply held sense of devotion and his gentle rootedness in God, which drew me into the mystery of God's love for the first time.

He will never know the impact that he had that day – and he is now one of the saints who has travelled faith's journey before us, part of that great company of encouragers. A lovely quotation in the "Called to be a Worship Leader" booklet says: "There is an old Christian tradition that God sends each person into this world with a special message to deliver, with a song to sing for others, with a special act of love to bestow. No one else can speak my message, or sing my song, or offer my act of love. These are only entrusted to me." (Francis Dewar, Called or Collared).

Thank you for the unique gifts that each of you bring and for the ways in which God has spoken through you which you might never even realise. As part of that 'great company', please know that each of us is supported by prayer, and held in the love of God in Jesus Christ.

The Leadership Year is an exciting opportunity for 18-30 year olds in the Methodist Church who want to invest time in developing their leadership abilities.

Worship and Preaching Community


As Local Preachers and Worship Leaders, we can't work alone! We're part of a community of people called by God to proclaim the transforming love of Jesus Christ, to build up the church for service, and to set the scene for people to meet with God. That's amazing!

It also makes the times we gather in fellowship and encouragement really special. Our Local Preachers' Meetings* are the beating heart of our circuit's mission and ministry. Or they could be. Often though, they end up being just another committee meeting to be fitted into the diary. The result is that people opt out, because they see no point in being there.

Here are five ideas for transforming our meetings:

Worship comes first - spend time in worship and fellowship, invite everyone to contribute something or take turns to lead.

Make learning central - tackle topical issues that matter, or invite people to share things they have been learning. You could ask those in training to share about a module they found interesting.



Talk through real issues - one of our tasks is to consider the work of God in the circuit. Talk through what's going on, the joys, challenges and dilemmas and pray about them. We all have valuable insights to bring to the table.

Ask people what matters - especially those who don't regularly come. Find out what would persuade them to come back. It's best to speak to people face-to-face if possible - we all get fed up with email questionnaires! Be prepared to take suggestions seriously, even if things need to change.

Meet at a time and place that suits people (especially those who don't already come) - you may be inadvertently excluding people who have work or family commitments, or who don't want to travel in the dark. Saturday morning at a coffee shop or Wednesday teatime at a central location in the circuit may work better. Consider holding some meetings on Zoom.



It's also useful for those leading Local Arrangements or wanting to explore what's involved in leading worship.



New WLP students are sent a voucher in their enrolment email entitling them to free postage should they order a paper copy from Methodist Publishing. To reduce paper usage and cost, we no longer post copies of Worship: Foundations to all new students

Artificial Intelligence (AI)

There's much discussion around Artificial Intelligence, and the technology is changing so fast. Like all new technologies, it promises so much, and there is clearly much benefit. It also poses many chanllenges and risks.



Look out for a new series of online courses next year looking at how AI affects our faith and how we understand Church.

For WLP students, it's almost impossible to avoid using AI in some form - even a simple internet search will probably use AI algorithms. However, care should be taken, as using AI to directly create project work is not acceptable. The use of generative AI without due acknowledgement constitutes plagiarism.

If you do use Generative AI apps such as ChatGPT as part of your project work you should make it clear in your project and make sure your Tutor knows. Remember, using AI to create sermons or project material for assessment is no different from asking someone else to do your work for you.

A polite request

Stefan Carney works hard to try to ensure that requests for certificates and admission packs for new preachers are printed and despatched on time. In order to avoid disappointment, please:

- Request long-service certificates in good time before they are required, and clearly state the date when you require them for presentation. We endeavour to print and send certificates around two weeks ahead of this date.
- For new Local Preachers, don't request the Admission Pack (Bookplate and Presidents' Letter) until the Local Preachers' Meeting has made their recommendation to the Circuit Meeting. At this point, the Trial Service and final interview will be complete, and the WLP course results will have been confirmed following moderation. Planning the Admission Service too early can result in disappointment if the outcome of WLP moderation is not as expected, and extra work is required.
- If possible, make requests using the Local Preachers' Return Form. If this doesn't work for you (it has its limitations) please email us direct at localpreachers@methodistchurch.org.uk.

As I write, the Olympics have just come to a close. Were you one of those who was glued to the TV, watching all kinds of sports you never notice the rest of the time, or were you getting grumpy that you couldn't find anything decent on the telly because there was sport on every channel. I was definitely in the first category!

As I watched, I noticed how my mood shifted as I was absorbed in Keely Hodgkinson's magnificent victory in the 800m, or Katarina Johnson-Thompson's personal best (also in the 800m) that clinched her first ever Olympic medal in the heptathlon. And it was fantastic

to see Simone Biles back on form in the gymnastics. For a few moments, it seemed that the world was a brighter place, despite the endless tragedies that form the usual media backdrop to our lives. We can't (and shouldn't) forget the present reality of poverty, violence, racism and climate crisis but it was good to concentrate for a while on the best achievements of humanity made in God's image.

Paul the apostle knew about sport - he speaks of running races and winning prizes. He knew too about darkness, fear, hatred and violence and had experienced it first hand. But he also speaks of light: For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light— for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true. Try to find out what is pleasing to the Lord... (Ephesians 5:8-10 NRSV)

As we lead worship and to share the good news of Jesus, we are amongst people who have all sorts of experiences of life. Some will be optimistic, some will be holding back despair. Some will be full of hope, others worried for the future. Some will be celebrating, some will be struggling. Our role is not to pretend that everything is fine, but to provide an opportunity for all to be honest in the presence of God.

And we also point to the light of Christ, the light that is found in all that is good and right and true. Because in Christ, we can be optimistic about the future and the possibilities that lie ahead. We believe that there is always hope for a brighter tomorrow. We should encourage each other to find out what is pleasing to the Lord, and the light that can overcome darkness.
