Vocations Sunday

Vocations Sunday is Sunday 5th May. It's a great opportunity to celebrate all those who serve faithfully in the life of the Church.

If you are leading worship on that day, you may wish to use the liturgy for 2024, which you can download **here**.

You could incorporate into the service an act of appreciation and thanksgiving for particular people in the life of the church, such as Stewards, Pastoral Visitors, Property Team etc. etc. as well as Local Preachers and Worship Leaders. The liturgy may be used on any suitable Sunday but if the church is not specifically marking Vocations Sunday, please consult with the Stewards, Minister and/or Worship Consultation first so that they know what you are planning to do. It would be appropriate to advertise in advance so that those who are to be recognised know in advance.

Could you do this?

In your church, there are people who could contribute to leading worship. They have gifts and talents to share, but may not even know the opportunities that exist. Here are three ways you could help people to find a new way of expressing their faith:



Local Arrangements are a fantastic opportunity to get people involved. Most of us respond best to



a personal invitation. Perhaps you could ask someone to read a poem that's meaningful for them, or choose a song and introduce it, or say a little about their own life and journey of faith? For some, being asked will be a real privilege and might lead them to think "I can do this!" Don't forget to catch up with them afterwards to chat through how it went. Perhaps a group of you could get together and explore worship leading together?

2. Share the love:

If you're preaching or leading worship, you don't have to do it alone. Why not ask someone to come along with you, perhaps to read the Bible, or lead a prayer, or share a reflection? This may be the start of them starting to think about becoming a **Worship Leader**, and will give them a taste of what it's like to work with a preacher in preparing and leading worship. Don't forget to have a chat with them about the possibilities.

3. Ask the question.



Most people who become Local Preachers say that there was someone who suggested the idea to them first. It often takes someone else to see the potential in all of us. If there is someone you know who you think God might be calling, speak to them. It may be that they've been waiting and praying for someone just like you to confirm their thinking.

Calling all Worship Leaders and Local Preachers



We all have unique insights, skills and abilities. Like Dave, you might be surprised at how they can be used in your church, circuit or district. Remember that many roles are can be of fixed duration and flexible to fit around your other responsibilities.

What about being a Circuit Steward?

Are you prayerful yet practical, visionary yet mindful and supportive of others' needs? Then maybe you have a vocation to be a circuit steward. The circuit steward has a vital role in shaping and leading the work of circuits; it's sometimes



described as having a 'panoramic view' of circuit life, with a team of circuit stewards using their gifts to develop the pastoral, spiritual, missional, legal and financial work of the circuit. Could God be calling you, with your unique gifts and experiences, in this time and your place, to be a circuit steward? And might this opportunity to serve allow you to know God in a different way? God Called Me - to Anguilla!

Here's a bit about myself. I am in my 50s, born and raised in South London to Caribbean-born parents. I am a Christian, a mum, nursery teacher, Arsenal supporter (had to get that in!) and a now in training Methodist local preacher.

This journey into local preaching began during lockdown, when I felt 'the nudge' on my heart and spoke to my superintendent minister about it. With the support of my minister, our circuit and local preachers' meeting, I started the Worship Leaders and Preachers' course, whilst beginning to lead worship on my own. At first the responsibility of leading services was daunting but as I began to grown in confidence as a new local preacher, I realised that I had to trust in God's grace and that I needed to be me. How I lead worship, my preaching style and voice, worship music choices, interactivity and exposition of scripture - will be unique to me and I shouldn't try to be a carbon-copy of other preachers or try to fit a certain mould.

Then, in November 2023, I moved with my mum to Anguilla in the Caribbean, the place of my mum's birth. A few years ago, following her diagnosis of dementia, we decided as a family that mum should move back to be near her family and as mum's main carer, I went with her.

On this small Caribbean island of 26 square miles, there are six Methodist churches, all with their own rich Wesleyan heritage and traditions. I am now having to navigate a new context as life in Anguilla is very different to the hustle and bustle of London life.

Sunday worship is very traditional in the churches here and there is still a strong commitment to the liturgical traditions of choir-sung introit; Collect, Epistle and Gospel readings, Hymns, Canticles and Psalms. Like many Methodist churches, there has been a decline in young adults, those in their 20-30s, coming to church. Having seen the success of Café church style worship services and the New Places for New People initiative in London, I am keen to get involved in creative initiatives here in the Anguilla Circuit that will help us to reach out to young adults and indeed anyone who feels that they don't fit in to a traditional church setting.

As my journey continues, I continue to train and develop as a local preacher using the WLP course and to share me expression of Christ in me. My encouragement to other local preachers, wherever God leads you, is to just be you. Led by God's Spirit, with wisdom, humility, grace and sensitivity to each congregation you serve, love out your unique identity in Christ, however that looks or sounds!
